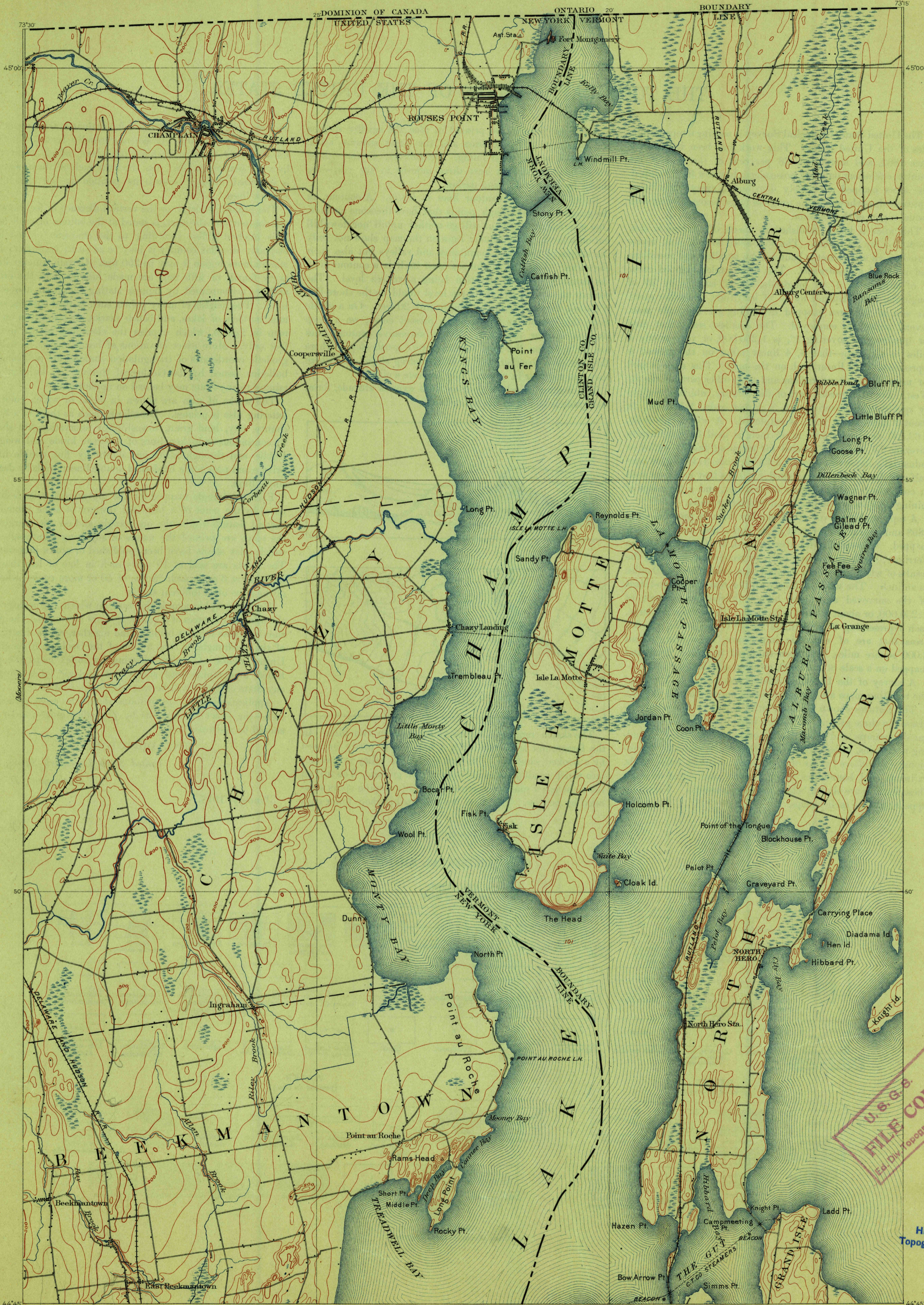

ROUSES POINT QUADRANGLE

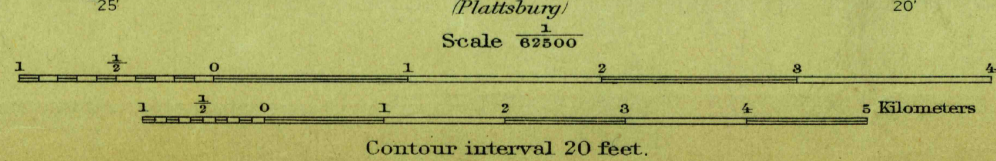
